

The Institution narrative and Consecration

In the last weekend's newsletter, we were reflecting on the liturgy of the Word and the Creed. As the Mass progresses, the focus shifts from the table of the Word to the table of Eucharist. The Eucharistic Prayer is the heart of the Liturgy of the Eucharist. Up to this moment, what was on the altar is merely bread and wine. Giving praise and thanks to God; the priest, then, prays placing his hands over the gifts. The priest, standing at the altar is only a minister of God, who acts visibly in the person of Jesus Christ. He calls upon the Holy Spirit to come down and transform the bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ by making the sign of the cross over the gifts. Following this, he recalls the events of the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper. From this moment, what is on the altar is the Body and Blood of Christ in the appearance of bread and wine. With this transformation, Jesus, the Son of God is truly, substantially and really present on the altar.

It is a great mystery, one that has been handed down to us from Jesus Christ at the Last Supper. The Eucharistic Prayers make clear that these prayers are offered, not to Christ, but to the Father. It is worship offered to the Father by Christ as it was at the moment of His passion, death and resurrection, but now it is offered through the priest acting in the person of Christ, and it is offered as well by all of the baptized, who are part of Christ's Body, the Church. This is the action of Christ's Body, the Church at Mass. The most solemn moment of the Holy Mass is the consecration.

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, it is customary during the Eucharistic prayer to elevate the consecrated Host, the Body of Christ as well as the chalice holding the precious Blood, lifting them up for the people to see. While this action of the priest is often brief, the faithful are encouraged to make a silent act of love to God. Many spiritual writers suggest using the words of St. Thomas the Apostle when he encountered the risen Christ, as the priest elevates the Body of Christ and Blood of Christ "My Lord and my God!" (John 20:28). It is traditional **to pray silently**, when the consecrated Host and Chalice is elevated. "The Eucharistic Prayer requires that everybody listens to it with reverence and in silence" (GIRM 78). Further on, after the priest has proclaimed the Institution Narrative, he announces "The mystery of faith." This is the time in response, the congregation either says or sings one of three Memorial Acclamations. The very last word belongs to the whole assembly. Once the priest prays the concluding section of the prayer, the *Doxology*.... "Through Him and with Him and in Him" everyone gives their assent with the great Amen.

First Reading: 2 Kings 4:42-44

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some over.'" He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said.

Responsorial Psalm: The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs.

Second Reading: Ephesians 4:1-6

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, through all and within all.

Gospel: John 6:1-15

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee - or of Tiberias - and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.


JESUS FEEDS THE PEOPLE
