Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 6:13-15, 17-20

Your bodies are members of the body of Christ.

The body is not meant for fornication; it is for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. God who raised the Lord from the dead, will by his power raise us up too.

You know, surely, that your bodies are members making up the body of Christ; anyone who is joined to the Lord is one spirit with him.

Keep away from fornication. All the other sins are committed outside the body; but to fornicate is to sin against your own body. Your body, you know, is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you since you received him from God. You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for. That is why you should use your body for the glory of God.

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.' Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,'- which means Teacher - 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' - which means the Christ - and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' - meaning Rock.

The Call of Discipleship....

In describing the call of Jesus' first disciples, today's Gospel also emphasizes how we, sinners, are to respond to Him with total commitment and life style to follow Him in thought, word, and deed.

St. Augustine reminds us that it is God, our Creator and Redeemer, who seeks us out, even when we are not looking for Him: "If you hadn't been called by God, what could you have done to turn back? Didn't the very One who called you when you were opposed to Him make it possible for you to turn back?" "It is God who initiates and who draws us to Himself. Without His mercy and help we could not find Him on our own".

What is God calling us to do, to be – now, today?

OUR LADY OF GRACE

THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONTINUED SUPPORT

Dear Friends,

At all of our Christmas masses we had a collection for our Sister Parish in Metinaro, Timor Leste.

Our two parishes began this relationship 7 years ago. I remember meeting with the Parish Priest Fr Angelo and his large parish council. Sitting under a huge Bayan tree in the parish grounds the people asked me if our parishes could help them build a school for their children.

Metinaro is the poorest parish of the Archdiocese of Dili. There was no school and its distance from Dili is around 30 kilometres. The road is difficult and transport is slow.

Her people are just wonderful people. Humble and devout. They have a keen sense of community and are very industrious. They want the best possible future for their children and they realise that in order to achieve this goal their children need a solid Catholic school education that provides human development alongside their faith formation. They understand this requires sacrifice and the help of others in the Catholic Church Community. This is where we play our part is sharing this dream to make the school a reality.

Thank God we have established the school which is now in its fourth year. The school is named after St John Vianney and has a kitchen which provides nutrition for the children. The school needs to urgently build another two classrooms in order to keep up with its growth and expansion. Our two parishes pay the wages of the teachers each month. As well, we help with the construction of the school as it develops. All this is testimony to the providence of God and the belief that HE is with us in our mission to bring dignity and joy to the poor. Thanks to the generosity of many parishioners we have continued to develop a true sisterly relationship to the parish of Metinaro under the title of Our Lady of Grace.

Fr Dionisio is the current parish priest and has become a good friend to me. I visit the parish and school every year and have maintained a strong link with the progress of our school. It is quite a miracle that the school thrives and we are blessed to be part of that miracle.

Faith and love are the reason for this miracle. We do our little bit and the Lord provides the rest to us.

The children have pride in their school uniform. The people of the parish are hard workers in the building programme. The school is also used for teenager and adult formation on the weekend and for English classes for those younger people who wish to go to university and those that work during the week in Dili. They also use the school building for computer classes for young adults and the covered playground is ultilised for many community activities including health education and faith formation.

Fr Dionisio is dynamic and very communited to his people. The children and parishioners of Metinaro are making a real difference in the lives of the poor. However without our continued support this is just not possible.









Like our two patrons John Vianney and Mary MacKillop, we know that faith without good works is useless. Our school in Metinaro is our opportunity to make the miracle of Christmas a living reality where those born in poverty are given the love to grow and develop their full potential as children of God. John Vianney and Mary MacKillop had the vision that we share, which overcomes obstacles and performs good works that make God's love tangible to the poor.

No matter how small or insignificant we feel, if we all give a little, the Lord will multiply our gifts and enable the children of Metinaro to live their parents' dream of an education out of poverty into dignity and worth.
