The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew

Now Jesus stood before the governor; and the governor asked him, "are you the King of the Jews?"

Jesus said, "You say so." But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then Pilate said to him, "Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?" But he gave

him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was greatly amazed.

Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to them, "Whom do you want me to release for you, Barabbas or Jesus who is called the Messiah?" For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over.

While he was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him, "Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal because of a dream about him."

Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowd to ask for Barabbas and to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them, "Which of the two do you want me to release for you?"

And they said, "Barabbas." Pilate said to them, "Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?" All of them said, "Let him be crucified!" Then he asked, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Let him be crucified"

So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water

So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying, "I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves." So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him.

They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him.

As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it.

And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him.

Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, "This is Jesus, the King of the Jews." Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross."

In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying,

"He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son." The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way.

From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him." Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. All may kneel for a period of silence.

At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus,

saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

Holy Week and Easter Services



In the course of our busy week, we most likely have times set apart for certain things that are important so that we can renew ourselves, our energy, and our perspective. Holy Week is a time that is set apart in our Church's liturgical year for our spiritual renewal. In fact, the word Holy refers to anything that is set apart for God's purposes. Holy Week is Holy precisely because it is an opportunity for us to focus on how we are spiritually renewed through the suffering, death, and Resurrection of Jesus. This is the time of year we stop to remember and relive the events which brought about our redemption and salvation. What we commemorate this week is not just Jesus' dying and rising, but our own dying and rising in Him, which results in our healing, reconciliation, and redemption. Attentive participation in the Holy Week liturgies deepens our relationship with God, increases our Faith and strengthens our resolve as disciples of Jesus.

The liturgies of Holy Week are filled with some of the richest and most ancient symbols of our faith tradition. The waving of palms on Passion (Palm) Sunday reminds us that we are called to be followers of Jesus, not just fans who cheer from a distance. As I mentioned before, this year our Holy week liturgies will be shared between Birkdale and Manly Parishes. We begin with the Mass on Thursday of the Lord's Supper, a most beautiful Mass that will be celebrated at our St. John Vianney Church, Manly at 6.00 pm. The washing of feet on Holy Thursday speaks to us of the selfless love that we are called to practice as disciples of Jesus. A period of silent adoration will follow for those who can remain. On Good Friday we will have the Stations of the Cross at 10 am, at Manly. The Liturgy of the passion of the Lord on Friday at 3.00 pm at St. Mary MacKillop's Church, Birkdale takes us deeply into the mystery of the power of Christ's love for us expressed perfectly in His complete self-offering on the Cross. The veneration of the cross on Good Friday reminds us that, as Christians, we believe that Jesus overcomes everything, even death. Good Friday is a day of fasting and abstinence when we particularly unite ourselves to the Lord's passion. All Catholics in good health aged 18 to 60 are required to fast.

The Great Vigil of Easter is a service held in both Manly and Birkdale at 5.00 pm and 7.00 pm respectively as the first official celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus. It is an opportunity for all of us to get together as one parish community and celebrates the great mystery of our faith. Then on Easter Sunday there will be normal Sunday masses. Everyone is welcome and encouraged to participate in all the Triduum Liturgies. Have a blessed Holy week.
