JESUS TEACHES ON MARRIAGE

The Catechism of the catholic church says that "The intimate community of life and love which constitutes the married state has been established by the Creator and endowed by him with its own proper laws.... God himself is the author of marriage."# 1603

Divorce was a controversial topic in Jesus' day, with two main schools of thought centered around two of its most famous supporters. The first was the school of Rabbi Hillel (a lenient and popular view) and the school of Rabbi Shammai (a strict and unpopular view). The Pharisees tried to get Jesus to speak against Moses or against popular thought; they hoped to catch Him in a trap.

Jesus emphasized the heart of the matter in Deuteronomy 24:1. Moses did not **command** divorce; Moses **permitted** it. This went against the teaching of Rabbi Hillel, who taught that it was a *righteous duty* to divorce your wife if she displeased you in any way.

Jesus now changed from a talk about *divorce* to a talk about *mar-riage*. The problem was not that they did not understand the law about divorce. The problem was that they did not understand what God said about *marriage*.

This emphasis on marriage rather than divorce is a wise approach for anyone interested in keeping a marriage together.God's real purpose for marriage is not fulfilled in divorce but only in seeing God's original plan for marriage. In saying, "**God made them**," Jesus asserted God's ownership over marriage; it is God's institution, not man's, so *His* rules apply.

Jesus reminded the Pharisees that marriage is spiritually binding before God. Marriage is not merely a social contract, and as God has joined He will keep together.

So, if Jesus is taking us back to God's original plan, what's in the plan?

First, it is **monogamous**; despite later Old Testament stories about polygamy, Genesis teaches that God's original intent was for *one* man and *one* woman to form a marriage.

Second, it is their **primary commitment:** they are to leave their parents and be joined to each other, which means that their first loyalty from now on will be to the new family unit they are creating together.

Third, it is **sacramental**, by which I mean that the physical action of the joining of their bodies in sexual union is a symbol of the deeper joining of their lives as 'one flesh'.

Fourth, it is intended to be **permanent:** 'What God has joined together, let no one separate' (v.9).

This is God's original purpose for us. Jesus' intent here is to show us that marriage is not just a legal contract rather, it is a deep, mystical, sacramental union.

Morning Tea Returns to Sunday Mass

Following the 9.30am Sunday Mass next weekend, Sunday 10 October, we will be holding Morning Tea. Stay back and join us for tea or coffee with biscuits and cordial for the children. Please note we will be adhering to Covid-19 serving restrictions.

COVID-19 Restrictions

Effective 30 September 2021 at 4:00pm the local government areas (LGAs) of Brisbane, Gold Coast, Moreton Bay, Logan, Townsville and Palm Island will enter Stage 2 restrictions of the COVID Safe Roadmap. Please find the new restrictions below for anyone who is or has been anywhere in these LGAs.

Face Masks: You must wear a face mask at all times when you are indoors, including churches and workplaces unless you are alone in an office or meeting room with the door closed, eating or drinking, or it is unsafe to wear a mask. This affects parish liturgies and events as follows:

- Clergy and readers must keep their mask on indoors but may remove the mask when they are 1.5 metres away from others.
- Parishioners must keep their masks while indoors unless unsafe to do so.
- Choirs and all cantors will be required to keep their masks on at all times.

Face masks must also be worn outdoors when you are unable to stay 1.5 metres away from people who are not from your household, you are eating or drinking, or it is unsafe to wear a mask.

Masses and Gatherings:

- Occupancy: At Manly our maximum capacity is 90 people (this is based on 1 person per 4sq metres)
- Outdoors:1 person per 2 sq metres
- Weddings and Funerals, when held indoors, will follow the same occupancy noted above. Masks must be worn.

Food Service: People eating and drinking must be seated. Masks must be worn except when eating or drinking.

Visiting vulnerable person facilities or the homebound:

- Visits to hospitals, aged care and disability accommodation services) will continue to have restrictions. Anyone who has been in the Brisbane, Gold Coast, Moreton Bay, and Logan LGAs cannot visit aged care, hospitals, disability accommodation and detention centres. Please contact the facility to receive specific directives regarding visitation.
- At present clergy or lay people may enter people's homes to take Holy Communion to the homebound but must keep their mask on during the visit and adhere to standard hand hygiene protocols.

Workplaces: You must wear a face mask at all times when you are indoors, including parish offices and other workplaces, unless you are alone in an office or meeting room with the door closed, eating or drinking, or it is unsafe to wear a mask

First Reading: Genesis 2:18-24

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven. These he brought to the man to see what he would call them; each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh. The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man. The man exclaimed:

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind.

As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

Gospel: Mark 10: 2-12

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them. 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

MESSAGE FROM ARCHBISHOP MARK COLERIDGE ON THE START OF THE PLENARY COUNCIL FIRST ASSEMBLY





After five years of preparation and consultation we're finally arrived at the moment of the first assembly of the two assemblies of the Plenary Council in Australia; the first Plenary Council celebrated in Australia since 1937.

Because of COVID-19 we've had to postpone this first assembly for twelve months. We're still in the grip of COVID-19 but we decided to go ahead even though now the first assembly will be completely online.

But here in Brisbane, unless we have a lockdown, we will gather as a group of about fifteen in Cathedral House behind me each day. So there will be some face to face, but most of it will be face to screen.

Now, not everybody can be a member of the Plenary Council. There will be about 300 of us online as members and expert advisors and helpers of various kinds, so that 300 will be online.

But in fact the Plenary Council is for the entire community of faith, all catholic people whoever you are, it's for you the Plenary Council.

So you may not be online as a member of the Plenary Council, but you are very much part of the journey of this week and that's why I write to you now.

If you're not online there are other ways in which you can take part; you can follow the live stream sessions each day, not all the sessions will be live streamed, but some will be and you are very much invited to join the live stream sessions*.

Then you can each day follow the updates that will be provided at the end of each day.

So again I invite you, I urge you to read the updates but most of all, to surround the assembly with your prayer; that this is a deep and real and powerful way of you sharing in the experience of this first assembly.

So the call is to all of us members or not the fact is you've been baptised and therefore you are very much part of the journey.

So let's take the road together and may God, who has begun the good work in us with the Plenary Council, bring it to fulfilment.
